3 - The Organisers

Fighting Blindness

Fighting Blindness is an Irish, patient-led organisation with a vision to cure blindness and to support people living with sight loss, and empower patients.

We started in 1983 as a group of families affected by rare, genetically inherited forms of sight loss coming together for support. The founders met regularly in Dublin's Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Hospital to help each other cope with the reality of degenerating vision. At that time,

genetic research into these conditions was maturing somewhat and the group, though small and without any form of scientific background, decided to investigate this new and exciting prospect.

In those pre-internet days, the only way to find out more was through attending conferences and events, which were costly and not easy to get to. In 1984, a few members of the support group travelled to Helsinki, where the umbrella organisation Retina International held a scientific conference.

The energy and motivation of Retina International inspired the Irish group and the discussions on genetics piqued their interest. Within one year the group had raised £500,000 to establish its flagship project at Trinity College, Dublin (TCD), examining the genetic course of dominantly inherited retinitis pigmentosa (RP).

In 1989, that very team in Trinity College Dublin discovered the first gene responsible for RP, and in 2011 that same project received a venture capital investment of €5 million to bring it towards the pre-clinical stage. Since our founding, Fighting Blindness has invested over €17 million in more than 90 projects. We are proud to be an organisation enabling the progress of research that may not otherwise have been funded.

Visas & Other Requirements

Visas

While visas are not currently required by EU nationals, EFTA Nationals, USA, Canadian or Australian nationals, all visitors are required to have a valid passport.

CPI will conduct a visa requirements review and proactively liaise with the Irish Ministry and Local Organising Committee to identify visa requirements for each country, as well as identify potential issues which could arise, for example, the necessity to apply for a Transit Visa in some countries.

The protocol of CPI is to meet with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade and provide them with a list of delegates and speakers who require Visas. Confirmation of payment letters are issued to each delegate who will in turn apply for their visa directly. Particular emphasis

is placed on ensuring International speakers have applied for their visa on time, if a visa is required.

Health Restrictions

No vaccinations are required to travel to Ireland and excellent health care is readily available. For minor, self-limiting illnesses, pharmacists can give valuable advice and sell over-the-counter medication. They can also advise when more specialised help is required and provide guidance.

EU citizens (EHIC) will be covered for most medical care but not nonemergencies or emergency repatriation, unless equipped with a European Health Insurance Card.

Safety

Ireland is the safest country in the European Union according to the World Health Organisation (WHO). In the Global Travel and Tourism Report by the World Economic Forum, Ireland was ranked the 15th safest country in the world. It also has one of the lowest crime rates in Europe and accordingly, delegates from across the globe experience a safe and pleasurable stay.

Health Issues (safety of water)

The quality of water is of a very high standard in Ireland and it is safe to drink directly from taps. Water quality testing and monitoring takes place at every stage of the supply system.

Internet Access

High speed internet access is widely available throughout Dublin and Ireland. Options include: dial-up, DSL, Satellite, 3G mobile and cable. Broadband is largely available in Irish cities and Dublin has the 15th fastest average download speed achieving an average download speed of 39.43 Mpbs. If using a laptop, tablet or smartphone to go online, the vast majority of hotels, B&Bs, hostels, bars and restaurants in Dublin

and throughout Ireland offer Wi-Fi access, usually for free (though there may be a charge in a minority of hotels).

Power Interruptions

There are no issues with power interruptions in Dublin. Infrequently, a large storm may damage a small number of power lines but any issues like this are repaired within hours by our electricity suppliers.

Conference Accessibility Plans:

Fighting Blindness will ensure that the very highest standard of accessibility is reached within the conference venue, accommodation, audio visual systems and translation arrangements) All conference materials will be designed carefully to be accessible and useful.

Volunteers

Volunteers will meet and greet guests at the airport and conference venue to assist visitors if required. There will be designated areas for guide dogs and volunteers will ensure that each guide dog's needs are taken care of for the duration of the conference.

Professional Conference Organiser

Fighting Blindness plans to partner with Conference Partners International, a Professional Conference Organiser. Conference Partners International will liaise with delegates on registration to ascertain their individual requirements and will ensure their specified needs are met for the duration of the conference.

Venue Proximity

The RDS is located 16km or just 45 minutes from the airport via the Port Tunnel. The venue can be easily reached by car by travelling on the M50. Alternatively, the Aircoach bus stops which leaves Dublin Airport every 10 minutes stops directly outside the grounds. Taxi and car hire services are also easily available from the airport.

If travelling to and from Dublin Airport to the Convention Centre Dublin, the Aircoach bus transfer takes approximately 25-30 minutes and brings you to a bus stop which is a 10 minute walk from the venue. Taxis can

be found directly outside the Arrivals Hall in Dublin Airport. Behind the CCD, there is also a LUAS (Dublin tram) stop, which has trams running to the City centre, taking approximately 10 minutes.

International Airline Connections

Dublin Airport has direct flights to over 180 destinations in 40 countries on 4 continents. It is also the only major airport in Europe to offer US Preclearance, enabling passengers to save time by completing all the necessary immigration and customs checks prior to departure.

Dublin Airport manages an average of 60,000 passengers per day, rising to 80,000 during the peak season, and handles more than 600 aircrafts movements every day. Expansion in 2015 was fuelled by 22 new routes and extra capacity in passenger numbers on almost 40 existing routes. This is expected to continue into 2017, as 6 new scheduled services have already been announced for this year, including new direct transatlantic services to Boston, Miami, Doha,

Dublin Airport is located just 11 km or 7 miles from Dublin city centre. There are excellent transport links in place both to other regional airports and to Dublin city centre. Transfer time from the airport is approximately 25 minutes. Not only is it Ireland's busiest airport, it is also the fifth largest airport in Europe, having had a record 27.9 million passengers traveling through its doors during the past 12 months.

Dublin Airport also won a major global aviation industry marketing award in 2016 and was named the 2016 World Routes Award winner for airports in the 20-50 million passengers per year category. In June 2016, it was named the Best Airport in Europe for Accessibility at the 2016 ACI Europe Awards. It was also rated number one for passenger experience ahead of all other European airports of a similar size in the 2015 ACI Airport Service Quality survey.
